Still all's well in the end, all tucked up, fed and ready for 2022 now.

On the social side as restrictions relaxed, in August we were invited to have a stand at the Lincolnshire show ground for Lincs Fest, which was well attended. Followed a week later with an open day here at Brook Farm for tea, coffee, cakes and a natter. September saw the Association Honey Show held at Thornes at Rand, well done to all you members who entered and generated enough points for Market Rasen to have their name on the Chairman's cup for the district winning most points again. In October, November and December we saw a return to formal meetings and the club honey show at the Church Hall, nice to see so many members turn out.

Finally I would like to thank Brian Purchon for his services as Membership Secretary, as he moved on to pastures new and handed over to Mike Seal. Of course I owe a great deal of gratitude to Mike Jeffreson, Celia, Keith and Lesley for their support though the year.

Honey production has been rather low during 2021 but the been have made a good job of drawing out new comb. The season started with 3 colonies. Swarming has all been managed without any problems and there are now 5 colonies which include 2 old queens, 2 home produced 2021 queens and 1 bought in from BS Honey. All colonies have been treated for varroa using Apiguard and Apivar. Mite drops in the late summer and Autumn were quite high but did eventually fall to minimal levels and the colonies will also have a trickled oxalic acid treatment early in 2022. They were all well fed on syrup and are being over wintered with a super underneath the brood boxes for added space and ventilation. Some of the spare equipment has been cleaned in readiness for use in the 2022 season but there is more still to be done.

Unfortunately there has again been an incident with the horses getting into the apiary area. The ground has been quite badly churned up in places and one hive was knocked over. The hive was righted as soon as possible but as this happened in winter it has not been practical to assess the condition of the colony. Although it is not really our responsibility to keep the horses out we are considering if it would be in our interests to do something ourselves to improve the fencing as the horse owners do not seem able to do so.



For 2022, we saw a different price structure with BBKA increasing their subscription by £2 for Full members (£1 for Partners) but this was offset by a £2 reduction in the County subscription (£1 for Partners). The District Committee agreed to waiver the district fees of £3.50 for a second year. The net result left all members paying the same in 2022 as for the previous year. BDI costs had not increased.

Richard described the damage done in the apiary by horses breaking through the fence and knocking over one of the hives. The floor was damaged and it was not yet known if the colony had survived. He deplored the lackadaisical attitude of the horse owners in maintaining the electric fence and said that we could not rely on them for keeping the horses out of the apiary. He, Celia, Claire Baines and Jamie Jackson had met at the apiary to review the situation. Together they recommended the district install its own electric fence and that this should be solar powered in order to reduce the need for monitoring. The cost would be in the region of £450, the committee had agreed with this expenditure. Jamie Jackson had agreed to add maintenance of the fence to his other apiary tasks.

Celia said the colony was now ill-tempered and may be queenless. Keith made the point that the hives were valuable and keeping them safe was a priority.
